Attending the World FF Conference in Hiroshima, Japan was an amazing experience. Conference sessions and speakers were interesting and informative, and we enjoyed meeting FF members from clubs around the world. However, the most memorable moments for me were the laying of a wreath at the Eternal Flame Memorial, the evening placement in the river of the 250+ candle floats we had all decorated, and the group singing of *Let There be Peace on Earth* in the Peace Memorial Park.

Our guided tour through the Peace Museum, showing the horrific after effects of the A-bomb, was followed by a tour of the Peace Memorial Park grounds. The tour included a visit to

the Children's Memorial, which was surrounded by literally thousands of connected strands of the paper cranes FF members and hundreds of school children had folded and brought to the park. There are so many strands donated, they have to change them out daily. Throughout these activities we were standing shoulder to shoulder with our new friends, who were from multiple Japanese FF clubs along with FF members from 28 nations around the world, all in the name of peace. As usual our November program was a delightful learning opportunity, thanks to Cindy Worayeth and




Haneen Fallah. While a student at CSU, Cindy met and married her Libyan husband of 32 years. Together they started Advanced Engineering Professionals. After the birth of their two children, they made it a point to visit Libya every 2-3 years so the children would appreciate their cultural background and know their extended family.

Cindy shared a PPT slideshow with interesting facts about Libya (i.e. 1 gallon of gasoline is 43ϕ , 3 million people live along the coast, a climate like San Diego, and the Berbers are the indigenous people of the area). She reviewed Libya's historical timeline from the Romans to present day. The people are friendly and reach out to visitors. Since tourism has not been a big industry, visitors are a novelty. Cindy felt Friendship Force was the perfect group to be welcome in Libya.

Haneen, a senior at FCHS, was born in the US; both her parents were from Libya. She, too, has spent time meeting her family and learning about her cultural heritage in visits to Libya. She shared about the recent revolution from her personal family experience. Haneen has been involved in several protests and fundraisers for the people of Libya.

Cindy sees a hopeful future for Libya due to the following strengths:

- Wealthy oil revenues
- A well educated people-- especially the women of Libya. There is a long history of education; it is highly prized
- Recently gold has been discovered in Libya; New oil fields that have an "easier to refine" grade of oil.
- Proximity to Europe--"if they survive financially"
- Tourism not much has been done in this area, but the country has much to offer tourists.

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JANUARY 11 PROGRAM



Ed Jakubauskas will bring us a program on Syria in January. He has titled it "Anatomy of a Failed State". This is a "current events" program you won't want to miss.

Emerging from the failing Ottoman Empire after World War I, Syria was a French mandate which included a variety of religions and ethnic groups. After the French mandate, a minority religious sect emerged as a dominant power group. After numerous revolts and rebellions, the family of the Assads assumed power through cunning intrigue and ruthless behavior. Current instability has led to a fierce and bloody Civil War, which in addition to internal chaos, threatens to spread to wider regional conflict. Can there be any hope for the people of Syria, or will the country endure endless strife and bloodshed?

A course on Syria's Civil War is being offered by the Front Range Forum at the Fort Collins Senior Center in January. This is a part of the series of courses being offered over the past few years on the topic of "Why Nations Fail" by Ed Jakubauskas

Biographical Background and Experience of Ed Jakubauskas in Russia and Eastern Europe: 1980-2010

My experience in the Soviet Union, Russia, and Eastern Europe covers a period of almost 30 years, It dates back to 1980 when I was a member of a group of University presidents who were invited by the American Association of State Colleges and Universities to participate in negotiations for academic exchanges between US universities and Poland. This was a period of time which pre-dated any hint of changes in Socialism. By 1981, "Solidarity" in Poland brought about revolutionary changes not only in Poland but in other countries of Eastern Europe as well as the Soviet Union. By 1989 all of Eastern Europe was in a state of revolution and change.

From this experience I continued to work on academic exchanges with Poland and the Soviet Union, visiting Education Ministries in these countries in 1981, 88, and 91. In 1989 I was head of a delegation of 15 American presidents who were involved in developing more extensive exchanges with the Soviet Union. After the breakup of the Soviet Union, and my retirement from AASCU and a university presidency, I continued to work as a consultant in programs related to economic development, education, democracy-building, and other transformative issues facing the new countries that had emerged from Communist societies.

In 1992 and 1993, I participated as a guest lecturer in continuing education programs with Lithuanian teachers in summer institutes, and in 1994-95 I was awarded a Fulbright to teach economics at two Lithuanian universities in Siauliai and Klaipeda This was followed up with another Fulbright award in 1998 to teach Public Administration at the University of Latvia in Riga. Courses taught at the Lithuania Christian College included Micro and Macro economics, and Transitional Economics (from Communism to Capitalism).

My early retirement years were noted by consultantships, US State Department assignments, volunteer work with numerous Non-Governmental Organizations, such as the Soros Foundation, US Baltic Foundation, Freedomhouse, Citizens Democracy Corps,. International Executive Service Corps, World Learning, and the American Professional Partnership for Lithuanian Education. I was also invited to work as a consultant in higher education with the Salzburg Seminar in working with emerging democratic universities in Poland, Romania, and Lithuania. I have lectured at Russian universities in Sochi, and Vladivostok.

Teaching, research, and consulting assignments took place in cities and rural areas of Poland, Latvia, Lithuania, Russia, Belarus, Armenia, and Romania. I also served as a Board member of a Mennonite college established in Lithuania, as well as a Board member of a Higher Education Council in Latvia. Academic articles have been published in "Lituanus" and the "Journal of Baltic Studies" I have a working knowledge of Russian and German, and am reasonably fluent in the Lithuanian language having lectured in that language for one semester in Klaipeda, Lithuania.

What a great experience! We had 4 from Siberia and a facilitator from St. Petersburg. Our United States translator used simultaneous translation and it just opened up an extra 25 minutes a meeting for Q & A. The Loveland Reporter Herald did an excellent job describing the dialogue. Yes, we had a lot more of that with this group due to the time saved in translating. One of the highlights for all was getting into the labs at NREL. It took Anne Brown a few hours of typing in security cards to get the group in. The government even wanted the places they were born. This group had a very high ranking government official--2.5 lines of a title--basically, Minister of Energy for Eastern Russia. He was so easy to work with that when I set up a conversation at NREL with the Head to work on Collaborative efforts, he later told me that "we aren't that ready for this yet, but we can work with Innosphere"--a Ft. Collins incubator business.

This same Minister wants to come back this summer to follow up on working for 2 weeks in the Loveland High Plains Arts Council. He plans to start preparations and meet with contacts about setting up two "Sister City" programs and the Innosphere negotiations.

I got 4 host outside our membership, all younger than most of us and hope they will be encouraged by the club members to join. At our Wrap Up party these hosts liked the Barn Dance activity and showing our guests a lot of different ways to celebrate Halloween. Hope you can make the February 8 program when I will tell you more about the exchange. Barbara Englehardt and Tom Ryan were Co Chairs with me. Helen Crihfield helped keep us on track during trips to and from Denver, so the hosts knew when to pick up their guests.

We have 21 ambassadors going for the entire trip. A doctor and his wife, a nurse, will attend for 5 days only as they are putting on an Asthma Clinic in Cambodia after they do the Asthma Clinic for our "trusted Partners" in Yangon.

Actually there will be 2 medical docs and they will treat about 100-150 patients free, as well as train 8-12 medical personnel in Yangon. This is a dream of mine since the 2006 Mission to Burma. This doctor is a Rotarian friend and so he is giving them equipment which we must take to Yangon for him, costing \$1200-2,000. Also there will be inhalers and other medicines. My Rotary club is buying the medical box and we are trying to get ICA to request Merck to provide the inhalers. We will see on that one.

Our effort now is to get the Aid recipients to understand that the project to start a club is important to them and all of us. We hope that then they will sign the "trusted partners" agreement which I developed with input from George Brown. We think that each trip should have this agreement, with the goal being to work toward the friendship club formation and home hosting when the government allows.

Ambassadors are enjoying collecting other aid for the Diplomat school, working on getting scholarships for students at universities in Wisconsin, California and (I'm working on) CSU. There is an on-line program at CSU in civil society that the president of one of my favorite Charities in Myanmar graduated from while I was there in November. So it all starts slowly.

I can't thank the club Board enough for their endorsement of this program and hope that when I get back and get a chance to show you what was done with just one Discovery group, you can see the value of Friendship Force International.

LETTER FROM GEORGE BROWN

November 16, 2012

Dear Friendship Force family,

I have decided to retire from my position as President of FFI effective June 30, 2013. This is something I've been considering for some time. There are both personal and professional reasons that have led me to the decision at this time.

At the personal level, I will turn 68 years old in June. I am looking forward to slowing down a bit and enjoying a long retirement with family and friends. I plan to stay active with some limited professional activities, but I will not be considering another fulltime position. In the years ahead I look forward to continuing my passion for international travel—but with a more leisurely schedule that can also include my wife, Jill. We are hoping to visit many of our Friendship Force friends in the years ahead.



This is also a good time for me to step down professionally. Having worked on the FFI staff for a combined total of 23 years, the past nine as president, I can look back with satisfaction on many great things we've been able to accomplish together. Our new Global Expansion Plan is well underway, and FFI is in very good shape. Now is a good time for the Board to select a new president to build on this foundation.

In my remaining months at FFI I will be working with Kathy Thomas, our newly promoted Chief Operating Officer, and the Board of Directors to ensure a smooth transition for new leadership. I will be traveling less, spending my time preparing the office for the next president. In addition there are elements of the Expansion Plan that I will be devoting time to as well, working with the Board and staff to use my remaining months as president to the greatest advantage for the Friendship Force. I will also be taking some time off to prepare for the next stage in my life.

Looking back over all my years at the Friendship Force there have been many great moments, but none more meaningful than the recent conference in Japan, with the theme "Hiroshima for Peace and Friendship." I wish all our members could have shared that experience as we reaffirmed the original goal of Wayne Smith and the Carters to use friendship as a powerful force for peace and understanding in the world. Our mission is as relevant today as it was 35 years ago, and I urge all of you to continue on this road we have travelled together.

This is not a goodbye letter, as I will continue to be in the office on a regular basis in the coming months. More importantly, I look forward to continuing the friendships I've made on six continents through this incredible global family we call the Friendship Force.
