JANUARY 12-TANZANIA AND UGANDA



For our January meeting, club members LaDonna Palm, Cindy Paulson and Marcia Ross shared with us their recent journeys to Kenya and Uganda (LaDonna) and Tanzania (Cindy & Marcia).

LaDonna Palm, and 22 Denver club FF members, spent 2 weeks in Kenya and Uganda followed by a 1 week Safari.

After arriving in Entebbe, the Kampala club transported them by bus to Kampala, Uganda. There they learned that:

* 75% of the Uganda population is under 35, due to deaths from HIV.

* 50% of the population is under age 15.

* "Boda boda's" – A motorcycle taxi, which originally transported from "border to border".

* Lots of vegetables, pumpkin, sweet potatoes, etc. and minimal meat

*Security everywhere - Security entering and within the Airport, as well as security for most other venues.

*Kampala borders Lake Victoria, which is the source of the Nile.

After a flight cancellation, they eventually made it to Nairobe, Kenya, which is a more modern city with malls, restaurants - again with lots of security. They had a home stay with a family with 2 children, ages 3 and 6, in a lovely modern home with 4 bedrooms.

During the week they visited an elephant orphanage, a tea plantation, a bead factory, hiked the falls and one day their itinerary was totally canceled for election day as there was concern for potential problems, so they closed everything down (malls/restaurants/businesses,

etc.). One evening, their host and neighbors roasted a goat in the backyard.

A third week was spent in Kenya on a Safari. LaDonna said it was an incredible and memorable experience and a journey of a lifetime.

Cindy Paulson and Marcia Ross said 26 Ambassadors communicated, planned and prepared for over a year for three weeks in Tanzania, which is South of the Equator, at the Indian Ocean. Also scheduled during the homestays were several humanitarian events. The first was for an elementary-aged school with children who were homeless, orphaned or without family. The group donated food (rice, beans and cooking oil), dental kits and even soccer balls. They visited other schools where they donated school uniforms, school supplies and candy. They also donated \$3000 as seed money to dig a well for the village. The women currently walk 6 or more miles daily to collect water from the streams, and the prospect of obtaining water nearby was thrilling. Other days they visited a kindergarten and a secondary school where they donated additional teaching and school supplies.


They were taught to cook African specialties, including "Ugali", made from corn meal which is squeezed and rolled into a ball before eating. They walked the neighborhoods and marketplace and learned where and how food was bought from local vegetable gardens.

They viewed renowned historical sites, believed by archaeologists and scientists to have fossils and artifacts as old as 2 to 3.5 million years old.



JANUARY 12-TANZANIA AND UGANDA CONTINUED

The conclusion of their journey was a 10-day Safari. In pop -up Land Rovers they toured five National Parks on frequently rough and dusty roads, but were rewarded with up-close encounters with hundreds of animals and birds-each park noted for different animals. The first park (Taringire) is also distinguished for its elephant migration. Lake Manyara boasts over 400 bird species and large game; Serengeti covers 12,000 square miles and has an annual migration of over 1.5 million wildebeests, 250,000 zebras and also antelope. Interesting fact* They stayed 2 nights in the Serengeti in a tented camp, escorted







to their tents at night by Maasai

sentries and were instructed not to venture out, but to use a whistle if there were an emergency. They could hear animals prowling outside and lions roaring nearby. The 2nd

morning they awoke to 10 elephants right by the next tent, drinking out of the canvas water bucket that was used for the shower.

They toured Ngorongoro Crater National Park, 3200 sqare miles which houses every major African animal species. The last park visited was Ruaha. They took a walking safari and, among other things, were shown deep holes beside streams the elephants had dug to find water. The guide said the sand filters the water to make it cleaner and also



prevents encounters with crocodiles hidden in the stream.

Their last day in Moshi they saw the elusive Mt. Kilimanjaro, the tallest mountain on the African continent.
