June Meeting

Peace Corps Veterans Discussed Their Experiences

At our June annual meeting, three articulate former Peace Corps members helped explain why the Peace Corps has been successful for 55 years. Panelists included our President-elect Cathie McCallum, who served in Jamaica from 1967-70; FFNC member Paulette Weaver, who was assigned to a mountain village in Colombia from 1967-69; and special guest Nancy Sturtevant, who entered the Corps with her husband in 2010 for an assignment in Ethiopia. Nancy now works as program manager for international students and scholars at CSU.

All of them enrolled as part of the traditional two-year minimum assignments, with Nancy and her husband joining as empty nesters rather than as young adults. They had always wanted to enroll, she said, and found that the experience after full careers was advantageous. "When you enter the Corps as a young person, you don't know how much the experience will change your life," she said. With a lifetime of experiences beforehand, getting quickly into the work seemed easier than for some of the younger people. She attributed this adaptability to life's teachings that enable most adults to balance idealism with reality. And perhaps career experiences show older adults how to work with ambiguity.

Cathie and Paulette each joined as young adults, shared similar training experiences, and had rewarding assignments. Cathie was able to establish a career day for the young Jamaicans with whom she worked. She also developed a training program on how to apply and interview for jobs. Paulette worked as a community action advocate to help identify and develop projects of importance to her isolated rural town. Both FFNC members describe their Peace Corps experiences as life-changing.

Last year, after our club's exchange to Peru, Paulette and Ken travelled back to Colombia, where they met up with their three adult daughters and were helped by Bogata FF friends of Cinda's. What followed was a thrilling journey to locate the mountain town she had left nearly 50 years ago. Walking the streets, the Weavers were quickly able to reconnect with residents. Some had even been Paulette's students. Others were sons or daughters of those with whom she had worked during the 60's. These joyful experiences illustrate what an impact the Peace Corps can have on the lives of those who serve and those with whom they work.

Paulette told us about the fascinating direct link from Northern Colorado to the Peace Corps through Pauline Birky-Kruetzer. At CSU in the early 1960's, Birky-Kruetzer worked with Dr. Maurice Albertson on a proposal to create a national youth service corps with a goal of teaching people in third-world countries how to help themselves. In time, she and Albertson were consulted by President Kennedy's team that was assigned to form a similar national corps. In 1961, Pauline coordinated the first training (in empty CSU Quonset huts) for the newly formed U.S. Peace Corps volunteers.

PEACE CORPS OPPORTUNITIES FOR OLDER AMERICANS

At the June meeting, Nancy and Ed Brigden showed a short film clip that provided testimonials from a retired couple about the specialized Peace Corps Response Program. Designed for Americans over age 50, this program (see information below) offers specialized short assignments of 3 to 12 months working in areas that match and utilize retirees' training and career experiences. Career educators or administrators, for example, might apply for a position abroad that would design and train teachers. Retirees with food bank administration experience might fill a short-term assignment to help establish a program for meeting food security in one of the 70 or more countries working with the U.S. Peace Corps. Applicants apply specifically for these short-term positions through a stream-lined process with the Office of Peace Corps Response.
