FFNC PROGRAM REPORT FOR JUNE MEETING



Four of our members reported to us on their recent travels, and shared interesting insights and lessons learned. Marilyn Garner and Thelma Slocum represented us at the FF Western Regional Conference in Sacramento in May, and reported it was an excellent conference. Marilyn shared that Sacramento is in the top ten of most diverse cities in the USA. She was particularly impressed by keynote speaker Joy Justice, who works with refugees and immigrants, as the world is going through the greatest refugee crisis in history, with over 60 million people displaced. Joy works for an organization called World Relief. She reported that the median time in many refugee camps is about 4 years,

and some spend up to 20 years in the camps. There are multiple levels of security screening and interviews, and immigrants have to take a variety of classes before they assimilate into a new country. Support teams are assigned to assist with language, finding food, medical care, jobs, transportation, housing, etc. Marilyn noted that there are numerous ways volunteers can support these people who, for a variety of reasons, are unable to return to their home countries. Marilyn also spoke about some ideas from FFI on intergenerational journeys and activities, aimed at bringing in younger members.

FFNC PROGRAM REPORT FOR JUNE MEETING CONTINUED...



Thelma shared that 125 members attended from 25 different FF clubs. There's a general theme in most clubs to try to sustain and grow membership, and rekindle excitement in club activities beyond Journeys. She passed around a chart with a variety of ideas that could provide social interactions among club members such as LEOs (Let's Eat Out), crafting for a cause, fundraising to help immigrant families, youth scholarships, etc. You can contact Thelma to learn more about these ideas. She reminded us that FFI endorses individual clubs setting up mutual agreements with other clubs for domestic exchanges, and then letting FFI know the arrangements.



Debbie Jones attended the FFI of the Sea, an 18 day cruise from Fort Lauderdale to Copenhagen. The FF attendees were among 2500 passengers. They had daily meetings and activities, and enjoyed getting to know other FF members from around the globe, as well as spreading the word about the joys and mission of FFI among other passengers. She shared that FFI is in the process of revamping electronic communication, reaching out to a variety of sites that are frequented by younger users. A bit more information about the World Conference in Boulder in 2019 was shared, including that there seemed to be good enthusiasm for participants staying in the dorms, having access to the cafeteria and being on the CU campus.



Dot Cada gave us an overview of her multiple trips to Myanmar since 2004. She shared stories about her involvement on trips with FF members Kathie Weinmeister and Barb Englehardt to deliver multiple suitcases of school supplies and clothing to children, and their efforts over the years to try to set up support networks for hundreds of children who don't have child care or food. Dot and others have worked tirelessly providing medical help, English instruction, hope and goodwill to the people of Myanmar. Their last several trips have focused on providing English language instruction to vocational school students, mainly to enhance their skills for various jobs in the

tourism industry. Member Jeff Allen is now coordinating the teaching lessons and will participate in his second Myanmar Journey in 2019. Through a slide show of beautiful faces and places, it was shown that beyond tutoring, Myanmar Journey participants get to do some very interesting sight-seeing of beautiful monuments, monasteries, busy cities and incredible scenery. During their last journey, they participated in an activity to light 1,000 candles for peace. The next Myanmar Journey, in 2019, will be in partnership with Rotary International. Kudos to Dot for her boundless enthusiasm and support for both Saratov and Myanmar citizens.



FFI WORLD CONFERENCE IN BOULDER 2019



Hello Fellow FFNC Members,

I just participated in an online Go-To-Meeting with Sue Palmer, our regional director, and other members from our region, including Ken Weaver and Debbie Jones from FFNC. We discussed plans for the 2019 FFI World Conference to be held July 23 through 27, 2019 in Boulder on the CU campus.

DR. HITES OBITUARY

Dr James D Hites, 87, passed away peacefully June 28th, 2018 at Poudre Valley Hospital in Fort Collins, Colorado. Son of Gladys and Nester Hites of Ohio, he graduated from The Ohio State University College of Medicine in 1956. He married his high school sweetheart, Sylvia, in 1952. They honeymooned at Grand Lake. She earned her nursing degree from Ohio State also. He had worked two summers on the unfinished Granby Reservoir Farr Pumping Plant.

Two years U.S. Army medical service were followed by seven busy years of general practice in Cortez and southwest Colorado. In 1966, the family moved to Ft. Collins. Nineteen years of devoted family practice followed during which he made house calls and was generous to patients as a Board Certified Family Physician while on the medical staff at Poudre Valley Hospital. After a short break, he covered for a friend's practice in Alaska for an emergency. An unexpected request came to be the Shipboard Doctor for the fall 1986 Semester at Sea voyage. Jim and Sylvia found amazing experiences! He changed to locum tenens medicine. He filled various requests for a short-term doctor in ten states from Ohio to Alaska for 23 more years, and Sylvia usually accompanied him. They were living at Grand Lake when he had a bad heart attack and realized he needed lower altitude. They returned to Ft. Collins.

Jim belonged to Westminster Presbyterian Church then Trinity Church in The Pines at Grand Lake. He was in The Friendship Force, Rotary (in Cortez) and had helped with Boy Scouts. Jim loved fishing, flying, college football, and music; his humor will be missed by many.

He leaves devoted family - wife of 65 years Sylvia, son Steven (Gayla) of Skagway, Alaska and Redmond, WA; daughter Lucinda (David) Hites-Clabaugh of Forest Grove, OR; daughter Sarah Clements (Brad) of Granby, CO; two grandsons, Alwyn and Ryan, and two great grandchildren. He was pre-deceased by daughter Kathryn.

A memorial service will be held early October at Grand Lake with burial at Grand Lake Cemetery. In lieu of flowers, donations may be made to Poudre Valley Hospital Foundation or a charity of your choice. Many thanks to Goes Funeral Care, the Cardiac Unit at Poudre Valley Hospital and all the caring nurses and doctors who took care of him during the last years.
