FFI FIELD REP UPDATES

The February Field Rep conference call included regional updates from all the participating reps.

The Australia and New Zealand national conferences attracted 260 members (Australia) and 120 (NZ) for full workshops, presentations and open forums. This was a very successful three days.

Exchange proposals for 2013 were sent out several weeks ago. To recap, there were many US clubs that did not receive an outbound exchange in 2012. Limiting factors included the numerous requests for European travel. Other clubs requested locations that had hosted many US clubs in 2011. The FFI Exchange Coordinator admitted that her approach to send many US clubs to popular regions in one year has created an adverse impact for the following year.

FFI currently has an Exchange preference waiting list, to which US clubs may be added. New and change proposals will be made at a later date.

At the March 15 Conference Call, George Brown (FFI CEO) will present an overview from the upcoming FFI board meeting.

FEBRUARY 10 MEETING PRESENTATION-BRAZIL

We had a very enthusiastic

presenter from Brazil at our January Heloisa meeting. Adegas, one of our youngest speakers, is 17 years old. She is here with her family while her father is doing post doctoral work in agronomy at CSU. hobbies Her are traveling and playing music. One



of her many interests is politics. (When she is President of Brazil, we can say "We knew her when...").

Brazil, the largest country in South America, is 8 million sq. km. and the fifth largest country in the world. It is divided into 26 states. Like the United States, it has different weather and vegetation patterns, dependent on location. The Amazon region is densely forested in the north. The northeast coast is semiarid; mountains, hills, and rolling plains dominate the southwest; and open savannahs fill the midwestern part. The world's largest wetland area is the coastal lowland. The climate is mostly tropical or semitropical with a temperate zone in the south. They don't have four seasons as we do, but two. It is hot about 90% of the time and cooler 10% of the time around September.

Pedro Alvares Cabral claimed Brazil for Portugal in 1500. The country ruled from Lisbon until 1808. In 1763 the capital was transferred from Lisbon to Rio de Janeiro because they found gold there. In 1960 Juscelino Kubitchek, in an effort to populate the middle of the country, designed the new capital city of Brasilia in central Brazil with an innovative airplane design. Brazil is a very diverse country, more urbanized than rural. The language of Brazil is Portuguese, the most spoken language in the world. English is the third. Two phrases she taught us were: "Oi" for "Hi" and "Tudo bem?" For "how are you?"

In early days, African slaves were brought over to work in the sugar fields. We learned that 40% of all the world's slave trade went to Brazil. It wasn't until 1888 that slavery was abolished by Princess Isabella. On September 7, 1822, Brazil became independent from Portugal. Brazil became a republic in 1889. But in 1964 the military took over and controlled the government for 20 years. In 1985 Brazil became a democracy with separation of powers between the legislative, executive, and judicial branches. The primary religion is Catholicism.

In the 1800's coffee came to Brazil and became its most important crop. Half the world's production of coffee is consumed in the USA. Today Brazil is one of the fastest growing economies in the world. The Monetary system is the Real. (1 Real = 1.75 U.S dollars). The private schools in Brazil are much better than the public schools but the colleges are public. Brazilians enjoy many sports, including volleyball, gymnastics, and soccer.

The food diet in Brazil consists of daily rice and beans together with pork and cheese breads and a wide array of tropical fruits. The tropical weather supports production of a large variety of fruits and vegetables.

Brigadeiro is a chocolate delicacy that is served for all children's parties. Heloisa and her mother made some and served it to us at our meeting. Yummy!

Heloisa loves music. In Brazil they have the samba, axe, rock, pop, country, MPB. She even gave us an enthusiastic samba demonstration.

Heloisa's dad shared that our talented young speaker is fluent in 4 languages, including English, Spanish and French.
