GERMANS FROM RUSSIA IN NORTHERN COLORADO

PRESENTATION BY CHERYL GLANTZ By GARY & SUE CUMMINS, REPORTERS



The Friendship Force of Northern Colorado was treated to an awesome program presented by Cheryl Glanz during our April 14th meeting. Representing the American Historical Society of Germans from Russia, Cheryl enlightened us about the migration of Germans to Russia and then to Northern Colorado, and, also their impact on our Colorado culture.

Her program started with Catherine the Great's Manifesto (1763). Catherine, a German princess, ascended to the Russian throne upon the death of her husband, Peter III, following his abduction and subsequent assassination. She won the hearts of the Russian people and her manifesto invited Germans to Russia.

As their population began to outgrow the available land and uneasiness grew between the Lutheran and Reformed Churches, the focus on immigration to the United States started to grow. Most of the Germans from Russia that came to Colorado came from the Volga area of Russia. Aiding this focus was the growth of agriculture in the U.S. and westward expansion by the railroad.

Approximately 300,000 Germans from Russia migrated to the states of California, Colorado, Kansas, Nebraska, Oregon, Oklahoma, Washington, and Wyoming prior to 1920. In Colorado, they settled mainly in the areas of the South Platte River, the Front Range, and the Cache La Poudre River. About 20,000 Germans from Russia came to our great state in 1902. Cheryl explained that most of the Colorado immigrants were involved in the then strong sugar beet industry. She said that the only remaining, active sugar beet factory is in Fort Morgan. Additionally, these immigrants were attracted by the need for laborers for the railroad.

Neighborhoods of Germans from Russia exist today in Globeville (northeast of Denver), the east side of Greeley, Fort Collins, and Windsor.

Sugar beet production positions weren't the only economic impact these immigrants had on Colorado. They were also involved in other professions, working as blacksmiths, shoemakers, lawyers, teachers, judges, nurses, physicians, and real estate salespeople. These immigrants were also instrumental in introducing Colorado to the krautburger, egg noodles, blackberries, watermelons, and sunflower seeds.

Notable Coloradans with Germans from Russia connections are John Denver, Glenn Miller, and Kevin Unger, President/CEO of Poudre Valley Hospital and Medical Center of the Rockies.

Cheryl told us that the headquarters for the American Historical Society of Germans from Russia was founded in Greeley but is now located in Lincoln, Nebraska, thanks to a land donation by the Amen family. The site includes a Research Center and a Historical Village.


In her closing remarks, Cheryl quoted Aleksandr Solzhenitsyn, "The German is like a willow. No matter which way you bend him, he will always take root again."

MAY 12 PROGRAM PREETHI BURKHOLDER AUTHOR OF "17 WOMEN WHO SHOOK THE WORLD"

Loveland resident, Preethi Burholder, will speak at our May 12 meeting, sharing from her non-fiction work: "17 Women Who Shook The World." Some of the women she will be sharing about include Eleanor Roosevelt, Marie Curie, and Victoria Woodhull, the first woman to run for the U.S. Presidency in 1872.

Some of the most amazing women of our time were born with unimaginable emotional, physical, and financial setbacks. They overcame all their obstacles and went on to become champions of our time. Wilma Rudolph contracted polio when she was five and could not walk until she was 12. At the 1960 Summer Olympics she became the fastest runner on earth when she won three Gold medals. Mother Teresa lost her father when she was eight and she went on to heal and inspire people all over the world.

We have a couple of others who have expressed strong interest in joining as well. Please continue to invite your friends and acquaintances to our meetings and events!



HAZEL KRANTZ 1920-2017

Hazel Krantz, a long-time member of Friendship Force of Northern Colorado, passed away on April 2, 2017. Born in Brooklyn, NY in 1920, Hazel grew up to gain a master's degree in education, and taught elementary school on Long Island for many years. Hazel was the author of 12 children's books. After doing her own research, she also wrote <u>She Walks in Beauty</u>, a story of Native Americans.

Hazel was married to Michael for over 50 years. They had two children, a boy and a girl, and an adopted son, as well. Hazel & Michael were well traveled across North America, and abroad. They moved to Ft. Collins over 30 years ago. They traveled on at least one outbound exchange with FFNC and often hosted.

After Mike passed away, Hazel continued to be active with FF as long as she was able, by hosting, bringing treats to meetings, and serving as publicity chair for a number of years. To point out her dedication to hosting, I will give share this example: We had an inbound group from Germany. The German Exchange Director was in a wheelchair. They had let our ED know, and wanted to make sure it would pose no problem. No one's home here was set up for wheelchair access, but Hazel lived all on one floor. She paid for someone to come and build a ramp for entry to the house, and the lady stayed with Hazel.

When we had Open World groups come, especially from Russia, Hazel asked her son and daughter-in-law to host dinners for the whole group, which they did. So she got her family involved. In addition to FF, Hazel frequently hosted foreign students from CSU. She often brought those students with her to FF meetings.

Hazel was a great networker, often making connections for FF leaders to needed resources. She remained mentally sharp, even after macular degeneration began to take her sight. Hazel Krantz had a wealth of travel information, and was willing to share it. In other words, we have lost a great cheerleader for the Friendship Force!

Hazel's service will be on May 5^{th} at 2:00 p.m. at Allnutt in Fort Collins at 650 W. Drake Road.
