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The Rivers, Ditches, and Reservoirs of Northern Colorado

Our speaker for the September FFNC meeting was Gene Webb, a longtime resident of Loveland, Colorado, who spoke to us about the Big Thompson Canyon and much more. Gene was raised in Ft. Morgan and holds a degree from the University of Northern Colorado. He explained to us that 60,000,000 years ago, the Pacific plates pushed up the Colorado Plateau and the Front Range. We're sitting on top of 4,000 feet of sediment from that event.



The rivers created in this area are of major importance to us today. The Northern Colorado drainage system includes: the South Platte, Boulder Canyon, Poudre, Clear Creek, and Big Thompson rivers. The most dangerous river is the Big Thompson, which is 75 miles long. In the two million years that the Big Thompson has drained through the mountains, the flow got bigger and bigger and created the narrows, the most violent part of the river. That section runs 25 times faster than the Mississippi and is 25 times more roaring than the Grand Canyon.

Before Colorado was a state, other places (including Kansas, Nebraska, California, Texas, and others) bought up water rights while Colorado was still a treeless plain with very few lakes all the way to the Nebraska border. It's difficult now to save Colorado water for Colorado because of these earlier water rights acquisitions. We were fairly isolated until the coming of the railroad.

In 1865, the Northern Colorado Ditch Company created a greener area that allowed certain crops to be grown, but the "dust bowl" draught occurred in 1930-32, and the rivers dried up. The only natural lake in Northern Colorado is Grand Lake; all the others are man-made.

During our area's early development, there was a 90/10 split between agricultural and urban usage. Then factories and suburbs took over , with their greater demand for water. By 1965, 29% went to went to municipal use. Since 1975, the population of Northern Colorado has grown by 65%, until today in some areas, that municipal use is even higher, with less and less going to crops. Dams were built in Estes Park and downstream on the Big Thompson River. A hydro-electric power dam was built on the Colorado River, and it created Lake Powell, which straddles the Utah/Arizona border; it helps to keep Colorado water for our use.

The floods of 1840, 1976, and 2013 have continued to change the landscape of the Big Thompson Canyon as the river and Mother Nature take back the natural flows of the river.

October Program: Palestinian-Israeli Relations: Who Are These People?

We are excited to welcome Dr. Robert Tello, a Loveland Internist, who will speak to us about "Palestinian-Israeli Relations: Who Are These People?" While Palestine and Israel have not commanded center stage during this particular political season, relations between the two have long been the elephant-in-the-room in many United States foreign relations discussions. We can expect the issues to continue to be at the root of much of our international policy. It has been nine years since FFNC Board Member Esther Sadeh led an exchange to Israel. So here is your chance to learn more about this complex area of the world.

Dr Tello has had an intense interest in the Middle East for most of his adult life. He served as a Naval Commander in the Persian Gulf War and earned a Bronze Star and Naval Commendation Medal while there. Long a student of Middle East history, he found that it all was brought to life during his posting in Bahrain. Then later, following a trip to Israel, he began an intense study of who exactly are the Palestinians and who are the Israelis. His program, which he often shares with public groups, will cover highlights of that ongoing study.

Bob, like many of us in Friendship Force, holds an international view. He and his wife travel often, and he is involved in humanitarian projects through Rotary and as a physician. He is board-certified in Post-Acute Care and Long-Term Care and currently serves as medical director of Good Samaritan and Green House Homes Long-Term Care Facilities in Loveland. He is past president of the Larimer County Medical Society and chair of the Department of Internal Medicine at McKee Medical Center.



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Wayne Smith Award to Esther and Dick Johnsen




